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IG Origins - Military History

- 1668 French Infantry & Cavalry
- Widespread application in Europe
- 1777 Continental Congress
 - Concern with army and militia training and readiness and use of resources
 - Accountability
 - Reporting concerns

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Federal IGs - CIA

- 1952 -DCI appointed an Inspector General
 - Charge Conduct investigations throughout the agency on behalf of the DCI; inspect the performance of missions and exercise of functions of all CIA offices and personnel
- Criticism
 - 1976 Congressional committees cited lack of objectivity and insufficient authority and independence
 - 1987 Congressional committees probing Iran-Contra Affair noted institutional limitations on the OIG
- 1989 Statutory IG established

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Federal IGs - State

- 1959 Statutory Inspector General and Comptroller for Foreign Assistance
 - Appointed by Secretary of State
 - Required to provide information to Congress
 - Granted access to other agencies' documents
- ▶ 1961 Amendments
 - Inspector General, Foreign Assistance
 - Presidential appointee with Senate confirmation
 - Increased scope
 - Permanent budget authorization
 - Stricter provisions requiring provision of information to Congress
 - Charge included effectiveness, efficiency, and economy

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Federal IGs - Agriculture

- ▶ 1962 House Intergovernmental Relations subcommittee investigation of Billy Sol Estes
 - Agriculture personnel "displayed a conspicuous lack of alertness"
 - Numerous investigations but no communication and coordination
- 1962 Nonstatutory Agriculture Inspector General
 - Created and appointed by Agriculture Secretary
 - Reported to Secretary only
 - Brought together audits and investigations
- ▶ 1974 Eliminated by Secretary

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Federal IGs - HEW

- Investigations in Senate and House
- Congressman Fountain's subcommittee
- ▶ 1976 HEW Inspector General Act

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Federal IGs - 1978 IG Act

- Mandate:
 - Audits and investigations
 - Promote economy, efficiency, effectiveness
 - Prevent and detect fraud and abuse
- Dual Reporting Agency Head & Congress
- Establishment IGs
 - Appointed by President with advice and consent of Senate
 - Removal by President; reasons given to House and Senate
- President's Council on Integrity and Efficiency (PCIE) established 1981

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Federal IGs - 1978 IG Act 1988 Amendments

- Designated Federal Entity IGs
 - Appointed by agency head
 - Removal by agency head; reasons given to House and Senate
- Powers and duties substantially the same as Establishment IGs
- Executive Council on Integrity and Efficiency (ECIE) established 1992

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Inspector General Reform Act of 2008

- Established the Council of the Inspectors General on Integrity and Efficiency (CIGIE) unifying the PCIE and the ECIE
- Codified Integrity Committee established by Executive Order in 1996 to review allegations of wrongdoing by the IG or senior IG staff
- Required 30-day prior notice of proposed removal of an IG
- Provided for independent counsel for OIGs

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Other Federal IGs

- Federal Entity IGs
 - Optional under 1978 Act
 - Agency heads report annually to Congress on status and activities
 - Not subject to most provisions
- Legislative IGs
 - Architect of the Capitol
 - Capitol Police
 - Government Accountability Office
- Military IGs

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
State and Local IGs - 1970s

- ▶ 1978 OK Human Services


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





























Major Elements of the IG Model

- Conducts audits and investigations along with other activities related to the mandate
- Charged with
 - promoting economy, efficiency, and effectiveness
 - Preventing and detecting fraud, waste, and abuse
- Broad authority extending to the actions of officials, personnel, contractors, and program beneficiaries
- IG is independent, nonpartisan, appointed on basis of integrity and qualifications

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Variation Among OlGs

- Federal civilian OIGs generally have similar missions and authority but vary considerably scope and resources
- Military OlGs
- Greater variation among state and local OIGs
 - Scope of responsibility
 - Specifics of mandate and authority
 - Extent of independence
 - Areas of emphasis

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Adoption of the IG Model

- Growth over time at the federal level
- Significant and continuing adoption at the state, regional, and local level
- Adoption by various nations and international organizations

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
